Often times we like to come up with a word picture to help us describe the reality of sin and salvation. And after wandering the beaches of San Diego this is my offering.

Do you ever pay attention to Seagulls? After growing up on the farm and living in family of hunters, I have been exposed to the flavors, personalities,

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uses, value of animals and birds. The barn
swallow makes his muddy mess of a nest in the
barn but he eats his weight in bugs. Even the
lowly sparrow with only his little tweets and
chirps eats his share of bugs. But then there is
this creature called a Seagull. Big as duck but
without the fun.

They have this outside appearance of beautiful white feathers with greys and blacks contrasting with the yellow of their beaks and feet. I have yet to observe

a seagull that is dirty
looking but they always
look pristine not like a
ruffled chicken or parrot
who has been plucked
revealing the nakedness of

their bodies. If a person was to judge a sea gull by just his appearance we might say it is a beautiful and mighty bird, like the eagle.

I do not dismiss the creativity of the seagull being wise to grab clam or crab and drop it on the rocks to get to the tender delicious bits. Yes, they are

indeed clever. If we were to judge a seagull from its creativity we would say they are a smart bird. Unfortunately from my observation the creativity of a Seagull is from a purely selfish motivation. They think nothing of their fellow gulls. They will steal food from the mouth of another. Dodging

and wheeling performing aerobatics of great display all for their own gain. Seagulls are the Ferengi of the avian community. If we were to judge the seagull from its actions we would label it nuisance, pest, self-seeking, rude, all things that sin relishes in. I have heard of rats that behave with more dignity than seagulls.

No the seagull is the perfect picture of a sinner who looks good on the outside but is rotten within. And what comes from a seagull but smelly nastiness.

Though my sensibilities are offended by the actions of seagulls there is something to be said. God created them and he loves them. And he provides for them. And as all creation groans under the sin that has corrupted it perhaps they too groan in their calls. What is the potential of the seagull? Can I judge or better said should I judge? Perhaps my own white feathers hide a heart of darkness that yearns to be made wholly clean. If I were to look at my actions I see the selfishness and know that the dirt is on the inside. I can only cry out with the call of repentance, and trust that the Lord Jesus Christ loves even a bird such as I.

Perhaps the seagull I see today will be tomorrow's eagle.

Hudson Taylor, a Nineteenth Century British missionary to China, is reported to have said, "God's work, done in God's way, will not lack God's supply." To know God's way, we need to know His Holy Word. Or to say it another way: you need to know your Bible.

St. Paul, before he spends two chapters on giving, wrote that every thought is to be taken captive to the obedience of Christ (2 Cor. 10:5).

Doctrine matters. And doctrine matters because the Scriptures matter. And the Scriptures matter because this is where we learn the teaching of Christ. Our thoughts must be brought into line with the teaching of Scripture so that our work is what God wants done and so that we do this work in His way.

A good tree bears good fruit. A bad tree bears bad fruit. We have been made good trees in holy baptism. We are fertilized and pruned for bearing good fruit by constantly hearing God's Word preached and taught in sermon and Bible Class and in receiving the life-giving, faith-sustaining food of the Lord's Supper. Remember your doctrine, hold on to the Lord's teaching, and your thoughts will be taken captive to the obedience of Christ.

Bringing every thought captive to the obedience of Christ is recognizing that God does provide. The Lord's Prayer teaches us to pray for daily bread. Praying this day in and day out reminds us that the Lord is the giver of our daily bread, and that we are to gives thanks for His daily provision of it.

God is rarely early and never late in His work, as Abraham learned, "on the mount of the Lord it will be provided" (Gen. 22:14). The Lord's generosity forms our generosity in return. Thus, we set aside for the work of God a generous, first-fruits, proportion of the daily bread that God has given to us. This act of trust in the Lord's provision is the working out of our faith in Him.

When budgetary discussions pop up, our natural reaction is to point fingers. But remember your doctrine, and what your mother taught about pointing fingers. Our first natural reaction is not always right. In fact, when our thoughts are brought into captivity of Christ, our first reaction should be repentance.

It should raise questions in our own lives. As good trees in Christ who are to bear good fruit, we should ask whether our thoughts are taken captive by obedience to Christ. Have we given generously? Have we given our first-fruits? You know. And God knows. "For the eyes of the Lord run to and fro throughout the whole earth, to show Himself strong on behalf of those whose heart is loyal to Him" (2 Chron. 16:9).

God will provide. He always has and He always will. He gives His meat in due season. He has not left you as orphans, but has grafted you into His own family. You belong to Him. Remember this, letting this thought dwell in you richly. And you will then be rich toward others.

-- but he never prays.


A Choir member's Guide To Keeping Directors In Line From the Thornbury Choral Society

The following rules are intended as guides to the development of habits which will promote the proper type of relationship between singer and director. (If you don't understand the humor, come join us on Tuesday nights at 7:00pm. We're a fun(py) bunch and

- 1. Complain about the temperature of the rehearsal room, the lighting, crowded space, and of a draft. It's best to do this when the director is under pressure.
- 2. Bury your head in the music just before cues. Be sure to hold your folder directly in front of your face. If possible, block the face of the person standing behind you as well.
- 3. Ask for a music selection or seating change. Ask often. Give the impression you're about to quit. Let the conductor know you're there as a personal favor.
- 4. Loudly clear your throat during pauses. Quiet instrumental interludes are a good chance to blow your nose. Rustle your pages loudly and, if you can manage, drop a page or two. Make



sure to pick it up immediately in the middle of the song.

5. Long after a passage has gone by, ask the director if your C# was in tune. This is especially effective if you had no C# or were not singing at the time.

- 6. At dramatic moments in the music, be busy marking your music so that the climaxes will sound empty and disappointing.
- 7. Wait until well into a rehearsal before letting the director know that you don't have the music.
- 8. Look at your watch frequently. Shake it in disbelief occasionally.
- 9. When possible, sing your part either an octave above or below what is written. This is excellent ear-training for the conductor. If (s)he hears the pitch, deny it vehemently and claim that it must have been someone else.
- 10. Ask the conductor if he has listened to the online professional recording of the piece. Imply that he could learn a thing or two from it. Also good: ask, "Is this the first time you've directed/ played this piece?"


11. If your articulation differs from that of others singing the same phrase, stick to your guns. Do not ask the conductor which is correct until just before the church

service in which it is performed.

12. Find an excuse to leave the rehearsal about 15 minutes early so that others will become restless and start to fidget.

13. Make every effort to take the attention away from the director and put it on you, where it belongs!

Ingredients

- 4 (6 ounce) skinless, boneless
 chicken breast halves cut into 1
 inch strips
- 1 (14.5 ounce) can chicken broth
- 1 (10 ounce) package frozen spinach, thawed and drained
- 1 (8 ounce) package cold cream cheese, cubed
- 10 cherry tomatoes, halved
- 1 (16 ounce) package dry penne pasta


Directions

- Bring large pot of water to a boil, and stir in penne pasta.
- 2. Meanwhile, in a large skillet over medium heat, cook chicken cubes in broth; simmering until done, about 10 minutes. Stir in cubed cream cheese and spinach. Return to simmer, and cook about 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in cherry tomatoes, and cook about 3 minutes more.
- In a large bowl, mix together cooked, drained pasta and sauce. Let stand a few minutes before serving.



What is Lent? Why do we celebrate it by giving things up?

Lent is a time of self-reflection and self-denial in preparation for the celebration of Christ's death and resurrection during Holy Week.

Before Jesus began his earthly ministry, he spent 40 days in the wilderness (Luke 4: 1-13; read this with the youth if you like).

We don't know much about that time, other than the fact that he fasted and prayed and was tempted by the devil.

So, in the same way, we ought to spend time fasting and praying in preparation for our ministry of bringing the good news of the risen Christ to the world.

Traditionally, Christians will fast from something (usually certain foods or drink or certain activities) during the 40 days of Lent.

This is to remind us of the great sacrifice that

This is to remind us of the great sacrifice that Christ made for us.

Jesus gave up so much to restore our relationship to God (Philippians 2), is it too much to ask of us to give something up for 40 days?

Ideas for Lent: Fasting & Feasting

Things you can Fast from

Social Media: Giving it up altogether may be difficult since many use social media for school or athletic purposes, but perhaps limiting your use is a good start.

Texting: Like social media, texting does have its practical purposes and is necessary in many situations, but be encouraged to call their friends and family members rather than texting them. A phone call is much more personal and meaningful.

Junk food: If you are in the habit of buying a soda or candy bar or coffee drink on a regular basis, encourage them to give that up for

Lent. Also be encouraged to use the money you would have spent on junk food to help others. Perhaps they can treat a friend to a soda or coffee drink, or they can donate the money to Heifer International or some other charity.

Sleeping in: You should not do this for its own sake, but should use that extra time on Saturday mornings to do something meaningful and productive, like

Things you can Feast on

Reading the Bible: Be encouraged to set aside time each day for reading your Bibles. The Gospels are a good place to start during the Lenten season.

Memorizing Bible Verses: You can memorize a verse a day, or a verse a week.

Prayer: Set aside a time each day for prayer, whether in the morning when you first get up or at night before bed. Or perhaps during passing period between classes.

Time with family: It can be difficult for families to connect with all the busyness in everyone's schedules. Parents will appreciate the initiative if you want to set aside time for family.
