Stewardship News

One of the best known and beloved psalms is Psalm 23, the Shepherd Psalm. There we learn that the Lord is our shepherd. And since He is our shepherd, we will not want. We will not suffer want because the Lord, our shepherd, will lead us to green pastures and beside still waters. In other words, the Lord, our shepherd, will provide for all that we need in both body and soul.

Yet, we live as though this is not the case. We live as though we actually suffer from want, that the Lord, our shepherd, will not provide for all that we need. And thus, we live as though the Lord is not our shepherd. And that means that we live as though we are not the Lord's sheep.

How do we do this? We do it when we put anything else before Him and His provision for us. When we think that going to work is more important than receiving the gifts that He won for us on the cross, a violation of the First and Third Commandments. We do it when we fail to give generously of the first fruits of what the Lord has provided for us because we think we don't know what the future will bring, even though He has promised that He will lead us to green pastures and still waters. We do it when we think that the Lord is only in the business of helping those who will

help themselves, we do this because we have a mind set on earthly, temporal things and not on heavenly, eternal things. We do this because we have stopped hearing the call of our shepherd, which comes through His Word.

The Word of God is how our shepherd calls us to himself. Through that Word, the Holy Spirit gathers and enlightens us with His gifts. Through that Word, we are kept holy and nourished in the one true faith, the faith that follows our Shepherd wherever He leads us. He promises to lead you to your true home, to the land flowing with milk and honey, to a better country, not of this world, but a heavenly one.

And so, here's the good news: The Lord is your shepherd still, even, and especially, for wayward sheep. For Jesus seeks and saves those who are lost. He finds the lost sheep and carries them back to the fold. He is the shepherd that lays down his life for His sheep. The Lord is your shepherd. Let us live then as His sheep.



What About Local Doctors?

Could you have made an appointment with your local family doctor physician in Jesus' day? Yes! However you must know this was a mixed bag. Some respected them and others considered them the worst of all the crooks. Because of the doctors' poor reputations the Hebrew rabbis invented proverbs to describe them such as, "The best among doctors deserved Gehenna," or hell. Another warned, "Live not in the city whose chief is a medical man."

Jesus also alluded in His teachings to another of those well-known proverbs about doctors: "Physician heal yourself," This saying was also to be found among the Greeks and Chinese. It was a skeptical way of telling the doctor that if his medicine is so good he should use it on himself first . . . then if he survived, others might also try it.

Another negative statement is found in Mark's account. This lady had been sick for 12 years and this Scripture tells us that she had suffered much at the hands of her doctors who had exhausted her funds. Interestingly, Luke himself a doctor, writes about the same story but leaves out the harsh criticism of the medical profession!

Outreach - Inreach

OUTREACH has to do with reaching outside our community with the Good News of Jesus. OUTREACH has to do with being obedient to Jesus' command, "to go into all the nation and make disciples" - Matthew 28:19.



INREACH has to do with reaching into our congregation with the Good News of Jesus. INREACH is about being obedient to Jesus' command, "love one another" - John 13:34. BACKDOOR LOSSES - Our congregation has them, every congregation does. These are the inactive members who "drop out" of church life. Statistics show that more and more individuals every year become "backdoor losses". It's a growing problem that -- silently and steadily -- can cut off the life of any congregation. Who are these people? What are they really like? Why do they leave the church? How can we continue to minister to them? And perhaps most important, how can our congregation "close the backdoor"? OUTREACH may add numbers to our membership list. INREACH may help to renew the faith relationship of followers of Jesus. Many persons have stood at the altar and promised to give allegiance, to Jesus. Yet, so many have wondered away. Of the five year groups of Atonement Congregation, the three largest age groups as of 2014 are: under 15, 19-34; 35-48; 50-65+. These three groups are also holders of our largest numbers of inactive. What can we do? How can we listen? How can we stand with these people? Can their walking with Jesus begin again?

SINGING WITH THE LUTHERANS

I have made fun of Lutherans for years - who wouldn't, if you lived in Minnesota? But I have also sung with Lutherans, and that is one of the main joys of life, along with hot baths and fresh sweet corn.

We make fun of Lutherans for their blandness, their excessive calm, their

fear of giving offense, their lack of speed and also for their secret fondness for macaroni and cheese. But nobody sings like they do.

If you ask an audience in New York City, a relatively Lutheranless place, to sing along on the chorus of 'Michael Row the Boat Ashore', they will look daggers at you as if you had asked them to strip to their underwear. But if you do this among Lutherans they'll smile and row that boat ashore and up on the beach! And down the road!

Lutherans are bred from childhood to sing in four-part harmony. It's a talent that comes from sitting on the lap of someone singing alto or tenor or bass and hearing the harmonic intervals by putting your little head against that person's rib cage. It's natural for Lutherans to sing in harmony. We're too modest to be soloists, too worldly to sing in unison. When you're singing in the key of C and you slide into the A7th and D7th chords, all two hundred of you, it's an emotionally fulfilling moment.


I once sang the bass line of Children of the Heavenly Father in a room with about three thousand Lutherans in it; and when we finished, we all had tears in our eyes, partly from the promise that God will not forsake us, partly from the proximity of all those lovely voices. By our joining in harmony, we somehow promise that we will not forsake each other.

I do believe this: These Lutherans are the sort of people you could call up when you're in deep distress. If you're dying, they'll comfort you. If you're lonely, they'll talk to you. And if you're hungry, they'll give you tuna salad!


The following list was compiled by a 20th century Lutheran who, observing other Lutherans, wrote down exactly what he saw or heard:


- 1. Lutherans believe in prayer, but would practically die if asked to pray out loud.
- 2. Lutherans like to sing, except when confronted with a new hymn or a hymn with more than four stanzas.
- 3. Lutherans believe their pastors will visit them in the hospital, even if they don't notify them that they are there.
- 4. Lutherans usually follow the official liturgy and will feel it is their way of suffering for their sins.
- 5. Lutherans believe in miracles and even expect miracles, especially during their stewardship visitation programs or when passing the plate.
- 6. Lutherans feel that applauding for their choirs would make the kids too proud and conceited.
- 7. Lutherans drink coffee as if it were the Third Sacrament.
- 8. Some Lutherans still believe that an ELCA bride and an LC-MS groom make for a mixed marriage.
- 9. Lutherans feel guilty for not staying to clean up after their own wedding reception in the Fellowship Hall.
- 10. Lutherans believe that it is OK to poke fun at themselves and never take themselves too seriously.





Annie's Fruit Salsa & Cinnamon Chips





Prep time: 15 min Cook time: 10 min Ready in: 45 min

Ingredients

- 2 kiwis, peeled and diced
- 2 Golden Delicious apples peeled, cored and diced
- 8 ounces raspberries
- 1 pound strawberries
- 2 tablespoons white sugar
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar
- 3 tablespoons fruit preserves, any flavor
- 10 (10 inch) flour tortillas
- butter flavored cooking spray
- 2 tablespoons cinnamon sugar


Directions

- 1. In a large bowl, thoroughly mix kiwis, Golden Delicious apples, raspberries, strawberries, white sugar, brown sugar and fruit preserves. Cover and chill in the refrigerator at least 15 minutes.
- Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).
- 3. Coat one side of each flour tortilla with butter flavored cooking spray. Cut into wedges and arrange in a single layer on a large baking sheet. Sprinkle wedges with desired amount of cinnamon sugar. Spray again with cooking spray.
- Bake in the preheated oven 8 to 10 minutes. Repeat with any remaining tortilla wedges. Allow to cool approximately 15 minutes. Serve with chilled fruit mixture.
